## Essay- 2020

We did a similar year end article back in 2016 (I know we have 3 months left) and it hardly seems like it's been 4 years already. It definitely seems the older you get the quicker time flies. This year certainly has done that. I used to have a retirement countdown clock on my desk I'd stare at every day that ticked off the days, hours, minutes and seconds to retirement. Well that was almost five years ago now.

The term 20/20 is a visual acuity measurement used in eye exams, which equates to *normal* vision. It is doubtful that anyone envisioned the year 2020 to be wrought with turmoil and civil unrest and it can hardly be considered normal by any reasonable standard. Certainly, there have been national crises in the past, wars, the Great Depression, etc. But this year has seen an upheaval in civil conflict and government overreach like never before. The very fibers of our Republic are being tested and stretched. Moral decay is at an all-time high. Today's previous topics caused a flashback to the essay from 2016 and what follows will be revisions to the original theme.

Today marked the 19<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the terrorist attacks on the US by operatives from Al Qaeda. I remember that day and the occurrences as they happened on the news (I was working overtime in the Communications Center). Just like I remember the day President Kennedy was assassinated (I was in 2<sup>nd</sup> grade then). Looking back at the aftermath of September 11<sup>th</sup>, 2001, the nation came together in unity and solidarity. National pride was taken to new levels. American flags were all over the news and everywhere. Fast forward to today, most American flags you see on the news are being burned by those who hate our nation and our way of life.

We've seen a great deal of "national discord" since the election of 2016 and all of the protests and those crying over their candidate's loss. The hatred for the incumbent President has gone beyond fabricating lies and rhetoric. Violent attacks on supporters by the opposition is a daily occurrence. Riots over police shootings have brought violence to new levels. Now they're burning and looting, tearing down statues and destroying anything that does not fit their program. Calling it peaceful protests is laughable. And it isn't over yet. Satan is paying overtime. There are plans in place for full scale revolt if the current President wins reelection in November. But we have assurances from Our Lord not to be afraid (John 14:27). Stay the course, stay anchored to The Rock (Heb. 6:17-18).

The essay that sparked the original I wrote back in 2016 was titled "Our Historical Myopia." Quite fitting as most people definitely lack the foresight for what lies ahead and they fail to grasp truth or flat out refuse to listen to it. We are witnessing an all-out attack on our nation and our values which is tantamount to the systematic dismantling of our county. Truth has been under attack since the Garden of Eden (Gen. 3:4-5) and we know who is responsible for all the attacks (John 8:44, Rev. 12:9). As a nation and as people in general, we have taken our focus off of God (Psalm 14:2, 53:2). We are too busy looking at our own circumstances whining about our own storms. We have all had our storms this past year. Some more than others but we have all experienced trials (1 Peter 4:12-19). I think it would be a safe statement that none of us has had a murder to contend with, no earthquakes, tsunamis, typhoons, floods, we *do* dodge an occasional hurricane, and so on (None of us have endured a scourging and crucifixion either).

True history has been watered down in our schools for so long there is no rhyme, reason or substantial basis for why the violence against our history is taking place, other than the total destruction of our form of government. Blinded by emotion and a head full of lies, protesters are out of control, supported by corrupt politicians (Matt. 15:14). There is no concept of what a hard time some of our citizens have had to endure. It is unimaginable to think that 618,000 people died in our own Civil War (1861-1865)! Most young people are clueless of this war and even who fought in it. Now we have a cancel culture who are bent on re-writing our history or simply deleting it without consequence to fit their agenda. Instead of 19-year old's storming the beaches of Normandy, nowadays they need a "safe space" to handle their anxieties over election results.

Back in the 1960's, 1962 specifically, prayer was removed from public schools in Engel v Vitale. The US Supreme Court Ruled that prayer in public school was a violation of the Establishment Clause. The Establishment Clause was enacted to prevent any government endorsement of any particular religion. The common misconception is that Madalyn Murray O'Hair was responsible for having prayer removed from schools. The primary case was Abington School District v. Schempp, but consolidated along with it was another case, Murray v. Curlett. It was this latter case which involved O'Hair, at that time she was simply Madalyn Murray. So, indirectly her case was somewhat a contributing factor. However, she did not denounce the blame. Can you imagine? Being proud of denouncing God in schools (**Psa. 31:18, 119:21, Prov. 16:5**)? She was also president of the American Atheist Society. She was murdered, along with her son and granddaughter in 1995 (Isa. 13:11).

Also, back in the 60's, society decided it would be prudent to develop kids and their self-esteem. It started in the classroom with a revision in the grading system and in sports. It began with the practice of issuing of participation trophies. Not just trophies but other awards, certificates and items for "achievement" for basically showing up. While trying to motivate some, it diminished the efforts of those that actually trained and worked hard to win. The concept itself is actually contrary to God's way (**Prov. 13:11**). Education shifted to indoctrination. Generation X, Y and "why me" and "me, me, me" soon followed. The blame does not belong to one generation alone. We've all stood by idly while the decay took place (Ecc. 10:18). We have become self-centered and out for "number one" (**Prov. 13:10, 1 John 2:16**). *We've long since forgotten God and His Word* (**Psalm 53:1**).

I used to spend a week annually in Orlando at Swat Round-up International, a 4day international Swat competition. Teams from all over the US and several international teams would make the annual trip to compete in head to head tactical competition for a cache of prizes that has grown to more than a quarter of a million dollars for the first-place team. The event surpassed the original intent focusing on training and became more of a vendor-oriented showcase and emphasis on cashing in on the monetary gain of equipment. Granted there are still a few (very few) old school "war dogs" out there who remember what the original intent was and still live by the code but it is fading with the replacement by the millennial generation of cops.

There was a notable decline in camaraderie among those in attendance. This topic was discussed during the week among several of the judges who had been around awhile. The level of "whining" and complaining on mistakes or grievances on procedural violations and penalties during the competition was unbelievable. A lot of these young folks (certainly not all) have a hard time accepting responsibility or holding themselves accountable for their own actions **(Romans 14:12).** In 2019, I was not invited back to judge after 28 years of volunteering. Not even a phone call or an email. A newer, younger group had taken over the committee and decided most of the old school "war dogs" were no longer needed. Typical of the generation… No respect.

Decaying attitudes isn't limited to Swat Round-up, it has poisoned the professional sports world as well. Kneeling instead of standing for the national anthem, protesting and a political agenda for inequality. I'm not a mathematician, but maybe someone can explain someone making \$50 million dollars a year for kicking or throwing a ball is inequality (2 Thess. 2:11, Rev. 21:8). Lying and believing lies is a nationwide pandemic worse than Covid-19.

There have been 911,282 deaths attributed to Covid-19 year to date, if you can believe those that keep the statistics. That is roughly 0.0001139103 of 1% of the Earth's population. In researching stats on line, looking at death tolls from wars and natural disasters, you'd be shocked at how many people died this past year.
